Does not support making PSHE and SRE statutory, as they 'trust schools to provide the right education for their pupils'. ¹¹	'We will introduce compulsory age-appropriate sex and relationships education' and work 'with schools to stop the blight of homophobic bullying.' No plans however to make PSHE compulsory as well as SRE.	Core curriculum 'will include PSHE: a 'curriculum for life' including financial literacy, first aid and emergency lifesaving skills, citizenship, and age-appropriate sex and relationship education... We will require the teaching of sexual consent in schools as part of age-appropriate sex and relationships education.'	'We support age-appropriate sex and relationship education at secondary level, but not for primary school children.' Does not support making PSHE and SRE statutory, and wants to scrap all SRE for primary school children. ¹²	Matter is devolved in Scotland. ¹ The SNP has stated that its MPs will vote in the UK Parliament on matters primarily concerning England and Wales that have financial implications for Scotland. But it has given no indication it will vote on other matters concerning England and Wales. This includes some of the issues discussed in this table. No plans to reform the House of Lords: 'While we still see a strong case for introducing an elected element into our second chamber, this is not a priority in the next Parliament'.	'Labour is committed to replacing the House of Lords with an elected Senate of the Nations and Regions, to represent every part of the United Kingdom, and to improve the democratic legitimacy of the second chamber.'	'We will: Reform the House of Lords with a proper democratic mandate, starting from the proposals in the 2012 Bill.' The 2012 Bill had some reserved seats for bishops, but party policy is that there should be a fully elected second chamber. ²⁰	No stated policy.	'The SNP believes the House of Lords should be scrapped and replaced with a fully elected second chamber.' 'Will your party legalise humanist marriages?'	No plans to legalise. The Prime Minister's Office blocked the legal recognition of humanist marriage last year. ²¹ The Government instead asked the Law Commission to review wider marriage law, which may take several years. ²²	Have pledged to give legal recognition to humanist marriages if returned to power. ²³	'To promote equality in relationships... we will: Permit humanist weddings.' Have described the ban on humanist marriage is 'illiberal and unfair'. ²⁴	No stated policy. 'UKIP opposed same-sex marriage legislation because it impinged upon the beliefs of millions of people of faith' but 'We will not repeal the legislation, as it would be grossly unfair and unethical to 'un-marry' loving couples or restrict further marriages'. ²⁵	Matter is devolved and humanist marriage is already legal in Scotland. I worry about legalising euthanasia because people might be being pushed into things that they don't actually want for themselves'. ²⁹	No plans to legalise. Party leaders support a free vote on the issue. ³⁰	Party policy states that 'medical assistance to die should be available to patients in particular circumstances', however, 'any such legislative proposal should be determined by way of a free vote in order to respect the freedom of conscience of Parliamentarians'. ³¹	'UKIP has no plans to change existing legislation on euthanasia or the "right to die." ³²	The SNP Government has not supported assisted dying legislation proposed in the Scottish Parliament. And they shouldn't be filmed or accosted.' ³⁴	When contacted by the BHA, said that the matter is a conscience issue that Lib Dem MPs would have a free vote on. No policy otherwise, nor policy in support of changing the abortion laws more generally.	No stated policy. 'We will encourage compliance with the Abortion Act 1967 and seek to make gender abortions illegal.' ³⁵	No stated policy. The SNP Government in Scotland has not sought to change the abortion laws more generally. ³⁶	When contacted by the BHA, said 'yes we support this'. ³⁷ Policy also states the party 'will not support any change to the current laws on abortions which would aim to more difficult for women to obtain abortions'. ³⁸	When contacted by the BHA, said 'We don't have a policy on this issue.'

Some of the issues we discuss are devolved to Scotland and/or Wales and so the Scottish National Party's and/or Plaid Cymru's policies are aimed at the devolved governments and not at the UK Government in Westminster. Where this is the case we have stated it. The SNP has stated that its MPs will only vote in the UK Parliament on matters primarily concerning England, Wales or Northern Ireland when those matters have financial implications for Scotland. But it has given no indication it will vote on other matters primarily concerning England, Wales or Northern Ireland and in the past has not done so. This includes some of the issues discussed in this table.
